Nicholas Galanin: The State of Being, Displaced

Nick Galanin, a Sitka-born Tlingit artist, understands that being part Alaska Native and part non-Native means that his world cannot be so clearly defined. Through his different mediums of art, such as video, monotype, prints, masks and paper, Nick expresses himself and the intertwined cultures in which he was raised. STATE SEEKS NOMINATIONS FOR HISTORICAL RECORDS AWARD

The Alaska State Historical Records Advisory Board (ASHRAB) Certificate of Excellence Award recognizes and publicizes archival excellence by individuals, institutions, agencies or organizations. On September 25th the ASHRAB will consider outstanding projects that merit a Certificate of Excellence Award. Archival categories under consideration include, but are not limited to:

- Arrangement & Description
- Milestone Projects (motion picture film preservation, format conversions)
- Exhibit or Public Event
- Publications, Guides & Finding Aids
- Rescue Event (endangered records preserved)
- Disaster Response Activity (post flood, fire, earthquake)
- Innovative Projects (something that has never been done before)

The ASHRAB solicits and encourages submittals of award nominations for significant projects that have been accomplished. Individuals, institutions (libraries, historical societies, museums), agencies (local, state, federal), and organizations (Red Cross, Rotary, business groups) are encouraged to submit nominations to the State Archivist electronically or by mail, describing and documenting the individual or group's significant contribution. No self-nominations will be accepted.

The award winner(s) will be announced September 27 at the Museums Alaska-Alaska Historical Society Joint Annual Conference awards banquet in Haines. The winning recipient(s) will receive a plaque.

TECH TIP: QUICKLY VIEW PAGE SOURCE IN FIREFOX AND CHROME

When a web page doesn't look like or acts like the way you expect, or if it's done really well and you want to know how it's done, it is very helpful to view the page's HTML source.

While all web browsers have a way to view page source, this feature is sometimes buried. But if you use either Firefox or Chrome, there is an easy and fast way to see the source of a web page. Just type view-source:[URL of the page you're interested in]. For example, if you wanted to see the code behind the Alaska State Library page, just put view-source:<http://library.alaska.gov/> into your address bar like:



Again, this tip only works for Firefox and Chrome. Users of Internet Explorer 9 need to go to the little “gear” in the right hand corner of the browser, and then choose “developer tools”, then see what they find under the “HTML” tab.
