March First Friday at Alaska State Museum Opening of the Exhibit, "Out of the Rain: Portraits of people emerging from homelessness in Alaska's Capital City"

JUNEAU – With the opening of the exhibition, "Out of the Rain: Portraits of people emerging from homelessness in Alaska's Capital City," the Alaska State Museum will be open with extended hours on March 2, First Friday, with free admission from 4 to 8 p.m.

"When Alisha was 15 years old, both her parents died of AIDS and her cousin was assigned as her guardian. Alisha suffered from severe depression and didn't feel safe with her guardian. Her guardian eventually asked her to leave."

Thus begins one of the stories of a diverse group of men and women, families, children and youth in Juneau revealed in the exhibit at the Alaska State Museum, "Out of the Rain: Portraits of people emerging from homelessness in Alaska's Capital City." In the show, local photographer Jorden Nigro has captured twelve insightful images of members of our community such as Alisha, who know firsthand what it's like to be without a regular, safe and decent place to sleep. In concert with the Juneau Homeless Coalition, Jorden seeks to break the stereotypes commonly held about homelessness and help find solutions for this ongoing dilemma. The exhibit includes short narratives gleaned through conversations with the participants who have graciously offered to share their stories.

In its effort to end homelessness in our community, The Juneau Homeless Coalition establishes, develops, and strengthens relationships among its 23 partner agencies as well as with clients, public officials, and community stakeholders that care about the issue of homelessness. This exhibit is also generously supported by the United Way Southeast Alaska and Wells Fargo.

Complementing the exhibit opening held on March 2 First Friday, guest speaker Nancy Burke, Program Officer for the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority, will address a free lecture beginning at 6:30 p.m. entitled "Housing First: A new approach to old lessons for housing the chronically homeless."

In conjunction with the Juneau Homeless Coalition, the State Museum is also hosting a series of free lectures on the impact of homelessness in our community, featuring a different speaker each week (see separate press release.)

Winter hours at the museum are 10 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. Free admission to the exhibit that will run through April 21 is available to those who bring a donation of canned food for the Southeast Alaska Food Bank. Regular discounted winter admission is \$3. Visitors 18 and under are admitted free of charge. An annual pass that allows unlimited visits to the Alaska State Museum and the Sheldon Jackson Museum in Sitka is available for \$15.
